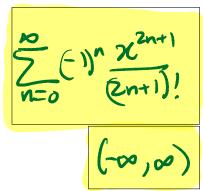

1. (3 points) Which of the following statements are true? You do not have to show your work.

- $\bigcirc \qquad \qquad \text{The alternating series } \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{\sin^2 n}{n^2} \text{ diverges.}$
- The radius of convergence of the power series $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{2^n}{3^n} (x-1)^n$ is $R = \frac{2}{3}$.
- $\bigcirc \qquad \text{If the alternating series } \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^n a_n \text{ converges absolutely, then } \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} a_n \text{ converges.}$
 - 2. (5 points) State the Taylor series at x = 0 for the function and give the interval of convergence. You do not have to show work for this problem. Hint: this is a common Taylor series.

$$f(x) = \sin(x)$$



3. (8 points) Find the Taylor series at x=0 for the given function. If you use a common Taylor series state the series you are using.

$$f(x) = \frac{3}{2+x}$$

$$\frac{3}{2+x} = 3 \cdot \frac{1}{2(1+\frac{2}{2})} = \frac{3}{2} \cdot \frac{1}{1-\frac{2}{2}} \stackrel{*}{=} \frac{3}{2} \cdot \frac{5}{n=0} \left(-\frac{x}{2}\right)^{n}$$

\$ Since

$$\frac{1}{1-n} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} x^n \quad \text{if } |x| < 1.$$

So
$$\frac{3}{2+\pi} = \begin{cases} \frac{10}{2} & (-1)^{h}, \frac{3}{2} \\ \frac{1}{2} & (-1)^{h}, \frac{3}{2} \end{cases} \times h$$

4. (8 points) Determine if the given series converges or diverges. Show your work and clearly justify your answer for credit. Hint: try a comparison test.

Direct comparison
$$\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{2}{n\sqrt{n+1}}$$

$$a_{n} = \frac{2}{n \sqrt{n+1}} \leq b_{n} = \frac{2}{n \cdot \sqrt{n}} = \frac{2}{n^{3/2}}$$

Ibn converges by p-test w/ P=3/271.

5. (8 points) Determine if the given series converges or diverges. Show your work and clearly justify your answer for credit. *Hint: try the root test*.

$$\frac{\text{Foot test}}{\left(\Omega_{n}\right)^{1/n} = \left(\left(1 - \frac{1}{n}\right)^{n^{2}}\right)^{1/n}} = \left(\left(1 - \frac{1}{n}\right)^{n^{2}}\right)^{1/n} = \left(\left(1 - \frac{1}{n}\right)^{n^{2}}\right)^{1/n} = \left(\left(1 - \frac{1}{n}\right)^{n^{2}}\right)^{1/n}$$

- 6. (8 points) Consider the function $f(x) = e^x$.
 - (a) Find the Taylor polynomial $P_4(x)$ of degree N=4 expanded at x=1 (in powers of x-1).

$$f(x) = e^{2x} \implies f^{(n)}(x) = e^{-x}, \text{ so } f^{(n)}(1) = e^{-x}.$$
And so,
$$P_{4}(x) = f(1) + f^{(1)}(x-1) + f^{(1)}(x-1)^{2} + f^{(3)}(1) (x-1)^{3} + \frac{f^{(n)}(1)}{4!}(x-1)^{4}$$

=
$$e^{(x-1)} + e^{(x-1)^2} + e^{(x-1)^3} + e^{(x-1)^4}$$

(b) Use the formula below to find the maximum error of using $P_4(1.1)$, the Taylor polynomial evaluated at x = 1.1, to approximate $f(1.1) = e^{1.1}$.

$$|R_N(x)| \le \max |f^{(N+1)}(c)| \frac{|x-a|^{N+1}}{(N+1)!}$$

Hint: $e^{1.1} < 4$.

$$f(x) = e^{x}$$
so $f(t)(x) = e^{x}$
and
$$|f(t)(x)| \le e^{1.1} \text{ for all } x \text{ in } (1, 1.1), \text{ and } e^{1.1} < 4$$

$$\leq_{0} |R_{4}(x)| \le 4 \cdot \frac{|1.1 - 1|^{5}}{5!} = 4 \cdot \frac{(0.1)^{5}}{120} = \frac{1}{30} \cdot (\frac{1}{10})^{5} = \frac{1}{300000}$$

- 7. (10 points) Consider the power series $f(x) = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^n}{\sqrt{n}} x^n$.
 - (a) Find the interval of convergence of the power series f(x). Hint: don't forget to test the endpoints separately.

(b) Find a power series for
$$\int f(x) dx$$
